EMERGENCY CONTACTS

In the event of a disaster, the Stonebridge Ranch Community Association (SRCA) will focus on protecting shared facilities and common property. You may spot SRCA teams preparing for imminent weather or assessing damage after an event. SRCA is not an emergency responder. PREPARING FOR DISASTERS & EMERGENCIES



Here in North Texas, we don't often experience large-scale disasters. However, events such as severe thunderstorms with damaging hail and high winds, tornadoes, winter ice storms, and fires can impact our region. At times, we also face power outages or civic and public health alerts.

Planning in advance for emergencies and disasters is critical for every household. When seconds count, foresight can improve chances for safety. In the aftermath of an event, residents who pay attention to communication channels can help our community repair damage and recover more quickly.

Prepare Your Kit

Whether you need to seek shelter in your home or evacuate, you'll need supplies. FEMA provides tips at http://www.ready.gov/kit. Your essentials check-list includes:



	Water and non-perishable food (enough for several days).
	Extra cell phone battery and/or charger.
	Battery-powered or hand crank radio to receive NOAA Weather Radio tone alerts.
	Flashlight with extra batteries.
	First aid kit.
一	Whistle to signal for help.
	Dust mask to help filter contaminated air, plus plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place.
	Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties.
	Non-sparking wrench or pliers to turn off utilities.
	Can opener (if kit contains canned food).
	Prescription medications and glasses.
	Infant formula and diapers.
	Food, water and supplies for your pet(s).
	Documents (i.e. insurance policies, IDs, bank account records, etc.) in a portable waterproof container.
	Cash and change.
	Emergency reference material such as a first aid book.
	Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person.
	Complete change of clothing (including a long sleeved shirt, long pants, and sturdy shoes) for each person.
	Fire extinguisher.
\Box	Matches in a waterproof container.
\sqcap	Feminine supplies, personal hygiene items, and sanitizer.
	Cups, plates, utensils, and towels.
	Paper and pencil.

Talk to neighbors in advance about how you can work together.

Inform Yourself


The City of McKinney provides emergency management. Visit www.mckinneytexas.org to learn about warning systems and other programs. If the City activates the Outdoor Warning Sirens (OWS), move inside and take cover.



Note that the Stonebridge Ranch Community Association (SRCA) does not provide weather alerts and does not serve as a first responder during times of emergency. In the event of a disaster, the SRCA will communicate regarding association operations and initiatives as efficiently as possible. The channels used will depend on the situation and availability. They may include:

- Signs placed at main SRCA entrances and intersections.
- The **SRCA** website at www.stonebridgeranch.com.
- Public <u>SRCA E-News blasts</u>. You must subscribe voluntarily via the 'Stay Connected' form located at the bottom of any web page at www.stonebridgeranch.com.
- The official SRCA Facebook group. Our group is titled "Stonebridge Ranch Community Association (SRCA)." The direct link is www.facebook.com/groups/2503900760278224/. We accept all join requests.
- The monthly **Stonebridge Ranch News** magazine.
- SRCA Broadcast Text messages. You may opt in to this service with you cell phone. Simply text 833-410-2060 and enter keyword SRCA. You may also call the SRCA on-site staff for assistance at 214-733-5800. Once your information has been gathered, your Stonebridge Ranch residence status will be verified. This service is available only to current Stonebridge Ranch residents.

Make a Family Plan





Designate escape routes from your home and a location for household members to gather outside. Plan evacuation routes from your village in case roads are blocked.

Prepare a game plan in the event your household is separated. Designate a remote friend or relative (one common contact) for each household member to call, text or email. Choose a designated place to meet outside the community for separated household members to meet.

Know emergency plans for children's schools, employers, and other places you frequent. Locate shelters near each one and ask how they communicate during an emergency.

Recovery

Residents are responsible for their own homes and should take steps to protect their own safety and limit damage to their own property. Following a disaster, the priority of the SRCA is to repair shared association assets and help the community return to premier standards.



If you need to make exterior home repairs or modifications following a storm, you may be required to submit an SRCA Modification Application and receive design approval prior to construction. To aid homeowners, the Modifications Committee follows protocols to expedite all applications related to storm damage. If the Board President issues a Disaster Declaration, initiating such protocols, we will notify residents via the SRCA communication channels noted above.
